The Ride Away from the Storm: An exhibition by young people highlighting the transformative power of art

Selections from the IMMA Collection

This exhibition is a dialogue between IMMA's Collection and young people who are participating in Gaisce – The President's Award at Oberstown Children Detention Campus.

In preparation for this exhibition, participants each selected work from the IMMA Collection that connects with their own paintings. They used tools and methods of citizen curation to articulate and share their perspectives, both on their artworks, and those from the museum's collection. The text that follows comes directly from the young people themselves. Where there are no selections, participants were not available to take part in the workshops.

Citizen curation aims to support communities who lack access to the museum to share their perspectives through selecting and interpreting works of art. This is part of IMMA's contribution to SPICE, a European research project.
