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1. Introduction

1.1. Name of Service

Oberstown Children Detention Campus

1.2. Nature of Service and Principles to Safeguard Children from Harm

Oberstown Children Detention Campus (Oberstown) is a Place of Detention for young persons referred by a Court aged from 12 to 18 years. It is the principal aim of Oberstown Children Detention Campus under s 158 of the Children Act 2001 to provide appropriate educational and training programmes for children referred to the Campus by a Court and to promote their reintegration into society as persons who are capable of making a positive and productive contribution to society.

1.3. Oberstown's principles to safeguard young people from harm are:

- Oberstown is committed to safeguarding the young people who avail of our services.
- The welfare of young people availing of our service is paramount.
- Oberstown is committed to child-centred practice in all our work with young people.
- We believe young people have a right to be heard, listened to and taken seriously.
- Taking account of their age and level of understanding, young people should be consulted and involved in all matters and decisions that affect their lives.
- Oberstown believes in supporting parents/guardians and professionals to keep young people safe from harm.
- Oberstown strives to work in partnership with parents/guardians and other professionals to keep young people safe from harm.
- Parent's/guardians have a right to respect and should be consulted and involved in matters that concern their family
- Child safeguarding is a multiagency, multidisciplinary activity. Oberstown will work with other agencies and professional in the best interests of the young people in our service.
- Every young person who avails of our service should be treated with respect and dignity.
- These principles will be achieved by having due regard to young people's health, safety,
 welfare, interests; providing them with proper care, guidance and supervision; preserving and
 developing young people's relationships with their families; exercising proper moral and
 disciplinary influences on young people and recognising their personal, cultural and linguistic
 identity.
- Oberstown Children Detention Campus provides care in accordance with our CEHOP model.



2. Risk Assessment

Oberstown has a dedicated health and safety team, and the responsibility for risk management is currently shared with the Senior Management Team. A Campus Corporate Risk Register and a Campus Operational Risk Register is maintained and reviewed on a regular basis by the SMT and the Audit and Risk Committee of the Board of Management. The risks are assessed using a 5 x 5 risk assessment matrix and the registers include mitigation strategies/management controls in place to address these risks.

2.1. Identified Risks

Oberstown has carried out an assessment of any potential for harm to a young person while availing of our service. This section outlines a list of amalgamated areas of risk identified and the associated procedures for managing these risks. Oberstown's Risk Management Policy HS-002 and our Children's Rights Policy Framework support the identification and management of strategic and specific risks in support of our Child Safeguarding Statement.
